 Implementation of Active Uniform has been a 'game changer' in terms of amount of active time in school and in terms of children's motivation and confidence to be active during the school day. SEND PE Interventions have delivered high quality targeted activity to hard-to-reach children. Improved confidence of staff to deliver high quality PE through Getset4PE Family activity interventions in Forest Schools, Tree Trail, Orienteering, Kinder walk and Big Stone walk. Maintained a high level of participation in a wide variety of intra and interschool sports events. Children have attended on average 5 events each in KS2 and 2 events each in KS1. 


